Key: *Successful Terminations*: This category includes those probationers that have terminated from JISP and probation or transition to regular supervision probation.

Unsuccessful Terminations: This column includes JISP probationers who were revoked or absconded. A revocation is defined as a termination from JISP for a technical violation, new misdemeanor, or new felony.

Absconded refers to probationers who become fugitives and are no longer compliant with probation services.

Total Terminations: In this table only, the total terminations include: revocations, absconders and successful terminations from probation supervision. Additional types of JISP discharges are included in Table 94.
