Colorado Probation is an important role of the criminal justice system. It provides the court and the community with an alternative to incarceration for adults and juveniles who commit crimes. Probation staff are state employees and work under the administrative authority of the Judicial District's Chief Judge and Chief Probation Officer in each of the 22 Judicial Districts. The Division of Probation Services (DPS), part of the central State Court Administrator's Office (SCAO), works with probation departments to provide program support, evaluation, and education.

Adult Interstate Compact


The Interstate Compact for Adult Offender Supervision (ICAOS) is a formal interstate agreement that seeks to promote public safety by



systematically governing the transfer of supervision for qualifying adult offenders. In FY2022, 1,268 probationers were accepted by Colorado and 2,681 probationers transferred to other states.


16,700+ Victims Served

16,702 victims were notified by probation staff of their rights in accordance with the Victim Rights Amendment. Of those, 23% opted-in to receive notice of critical events that occur during supervision. 24,752 critical events were relayed to victims in FY2022.




The cost of corrections is directly related to the level of containment for each sentencing option.

ADULT CORRECTIONS POPULATION COMPARED TO GENERAL FUND ALLOCATION FOR FY2022


