The face of court interpreting is changing. In a world in which a global pandemic has caused most industries to drastically alter the way they do business to adapt to safety protocols and social-distancing requirements, interpreters now find themselves tasked with providing high-level services in a multitude of virtual settings using an array of remote technology.

The judicial interpreter's professional responsibilities have not changed, but the virtual environments within which interpreters now work often times presents unanticipated ethical challenges that must be understood to safeguard the integrity of the judicial process.

The focus of this 2-hour webinar is to provide interpreters with pragmatic guidance, knowledge, and skills to assist them in making sound ethical decisions while plying their trade in a variety of unpredictable remote settings. During the live session, participants will collaborate with the instructor to analyze the judicial interpreter's ethical responsibilities in virtual settings, and apply what they learn by taking part in numerous skits and hands-on exercise.
