We use the term “implicit bias” to describe when we have attitudes towards people or associate stereotypes about them without our conscious knowledge. We all have implicit biases to some degree and they can have a tremendous impact on our decision making. We may not necessarily act in an inappropriate or unethical manner, but it is important to be aware in order to make well informed decisions within our role as interpreters.

In this class we will learn how implicit bias can affect how we interpret. How we approach an assignment. We will go deep into understanding how an interpreter’s implicit biases can impact the parties involved; defendant vs. victim, the legal process itself and our profession.
