- Objective: Students become familiar with Court of Appeals judges, who are state officials.
(Colorado Model Content Standards: Civics, Standard 2.1, grades 9-12)
- Activities: Class participation activity and homework assignment.
- Outcomes: Students will be familiar with the judges who will be presiding over the hearings at their school.
- Grade Level: Grades 9-12

Message from former Colorado Court of Appeals Judge José D. L. Márquez:

Introducing Judges on the Colorado Court of Appeals

Extensive experience in the law is perhaps the most distinctive characteristic of the 22 judges on the Colorado Court of Appeals.

Members of the court come from diverse backgrounds. They have worked in private practice; served as law professors; provided legal services for the poor; and served as public defenders, district attorneys, assistant attorneys general, and assistant staff judge advocates in the military.

Not reflected in all the biographies are the many other activities in which judges are involved. Almost all judges serve or have served on a number of boards, committees, and task forces that are law related. Many have served on the boards governing the Colorado and other bar associations and as trustees for the Denver Bar Association. Some are active in community organizations such as the University Club and Rotary, and others are active in their churches or synagogues. Almost all are parents, and a number have served in the military. Members of the court enjoy traveling, reading, music, theater, sports, and a host of other interests.

Qualifications for becoming a Colorado Court of Appeals judge: A nominee to the Court of Appeals must be a qualified elector of the state of Colorado, licensed to practice law in Colorado for at least five years, and under the age of 72 at the time his or her name is submitted to the governor.

Classroom activities:

- 1) Have the students read through the biographies of the judges.
- 2) Generate discussion about the judges by asking the students:
 - Do the Colorado Court of Appeals judges reflect the diversity of the population of the State of Colorado? Why do you think that each of these judges was selected to serve in this position?
 - Does anything surprise you about who is sitting on the Court of Appeals?
- 3) How do the past professional experiences of the judges differ? What impact do you think this has on the judiciary?

Chief Judge Steven Bernard

Date of Judicial Appointment: July 5, 2006



Steve Bernard was born in Colorado Springs, Colorado, in 1952, where he grew up. He received both of his degrees from the University of Colorado, a B.A. in political science in 1975 and a law degree in 1978.

Mr. Bernard began his legal career at the District Attorney's Office for Colorado's Seventeenth Judicial District (now Adams and Broomfield Counties) in 1978. He served as a deputy district attorney from 1978 to 1982, handling child support, misdemeanor and felony trials and appeals. He became a chief trial deputy in 1982, responsible for arguing appeals before Colorado's appellate courts and trying major and complex cases, such as death penalty prosecutions, civil forfeitures and grand jury proceedings. Mr. Bernard became the assistant district attorney in 1993, assisting the district attorney in the day-to-day management of a large district attorney's office, as well as continuing to be involved in trial and appellate litigation of significant cases. During this period of time, he was a frequent lecturer on a variety of legal subjects, ranging from the death penalty, to the law of evidence, to constitutional law, to trial techniques. Mr. Bernard retired from this position in December 2004.

In January of 2005, Mr. Bernard became a chief deputy district attorney with the Nineteenth Judicial District (Weld County). He was responsible for filing felony cases, training new prosecutors and police officers and conducting grand jury litigation.

Mr. Bernard has been involved in a variety of professional and community activities. He served on the governing board of the Colorado District Attorneys' Association, Colorado's statewide prosecutor's organization. He is a former member of the Adams County Bar Association and a present member of the Weld County, Colorado and American Bar Associations. He served as a member of the Supreme Court Nominating Commission from 1997 to 2002. He was chairman of the Adams County Community Corrections Board from 1994 to 2000 and a member of the Weld County Community Corrections Board from 2005 to 2006. Mr. Bernard was co-chairman of Save Open Space, a nonpartisan group that worked to secure an open space sales tax in Adams County in 1999 and to extend the tax in 2004, and he served on the Adams County Open Space Advisory Board from 2000 to 2004.

In 2002, Mr. Bernard was named Lecturer of the Year for his contributions to educational programs sponsored by the Colorado District Attorneys' Council. He was named appellate prosecutor of the year for United States Region I by the Association of Government Attorneys in Capital Litigation in 2001.

Mr. Bernard and his wife Molly were married in 1975.

Governor Bill Owens appointed Mr. Bernard to the Colorado Court of Appeals in May 2006. Mr. Bernard took the oath of office as a Court of Appeals Judge on July 5, 2006.

Judge Webb was appointed to the Colorado Court of Appeals in 2002. He graduated Phi Beta Kappa from the University of North Dakota in 1970 and from the University of Colorado School of Law in 1973, Order of the Coif. From 1973-1974, Judge Webb served as law clerk for Honorable Robert H. McWilliams at the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 10th Circuit. After his clerkship, he practiced in the areas of complex commercial litigation and employment, most recently with Jacobs Chase Frick Kleinkopf & Kelley, LLC.

Judge Webb has served on the Colorado Supreme Court Standing Committee on Rules of Civil Procedure, the Colorado Supreme Court Standing Committee on the Rules of Professional Conduct, the Judicial Ethics Advisory Board, and *The Colorado Lawyer* Board of Editors. Judge Hawthorne was sworn in as a judge of the Colorado Court of Appeals on January 28, 2005. Since becoming a judge, he has represented the Court of Appeals as a member of the Colorado Judicial Coordinating Council and as the court's representative to the Deans' Diversity Council/Colorado Campaign for Inclusive Excellence. Judge Hawthorne is a Colorado Bar Foundation Fellow, a Colorado and Denver Bar Association member, and an Executive Committee member and past president of the Minoru Yasui Inn of Court. He participates in the Colorado Access to Justice program, CU and DU Schools of Law Intern Diversity programs, Denver Regional and State High School Mock Trial tournaments, and the Colorado Close Up and We the People middle school programs. Judge Hawthorne has served as an adjunct professor in the Criminal Justice Department of the School of Public Affairs at the University of Colorado-Denver, a speaker for the CBA/CJI's *Our Courts* program and chair of its Partners Committee, presenter at the annual Colorado Judicial Conference and the Denver Bar Association's brown bag lunch program, and has spoken to elementary, high school and college classes about Colorado's court system.

Laurie Booras was appointed to the Colorado Court of Appeals to fill one of the vacancies created by the retirements of Judges Rothenberg and Vogt. Booras grew up in Lawton, Oklahoma. She graduated from the University of Texas School of Law in 1982, and began her legal career at the Texas Attorney General's office defending against federal habeas corpus actions filed by state prisoners. From March, 1985, to November, 1990, she served as an Assistant District Attorney in the Travis County District Attorney's office in Austin, Texas, and the Bexar County District Attorney's Office in San Antonio, Texas.

In 1991, Booras began working in the Colorado Attorney General's office in the Appellate Division, and was promoted to First Assistant Attorney General in January 2000. Terry Fox is the newest judge sitting on the Colorado Court of Appeals, having been sworn in on January 7, 2011, following her September 2, 2010 appointment. From 2004-2010, she served as an assistant U.S. Attorney in Colorado, working as trial counsel to federal agencies and specializing in environmental, constitutional, and other civil matters. In addition to her legal duties, Judge Fox served on the U.S. Attorney's Advisory Council and the Diversity Committee. Before joining the U.S. Attorney's Office, Judge Fox was an attorney with the Colorado Attorney General's Office, an associate with the law firm of Holland & Hart (where she practiced Environmental Law), and a clerk for Justice Craig Enoch on the Texas Supreme Court. She serves on the Colorado Supreme Court's Attorney Regulation Committee, the

Colorado Supreme Court's Board of Law Examiners, and is a member of the Colorado Hispanic Bar Association, which recognized her in 2006 with its Chris Miranda Outstanding Lawyer Award, and in 1997 with its Outstanding Young Lawyer Award. Judge Fox is a long time member and former board member of the Colorado Women's Bar Association (CWBA). In 2002 she was selected as a Marshall Memorial Fellow which allowed her to travel with other emerging American leaders to five countries in Europe.
